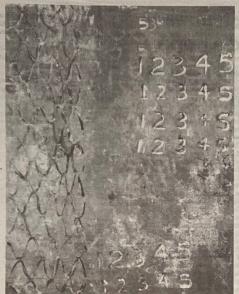
Patterns emerge from wash of color

Late bloomer to art enjoys the blend of colors and design

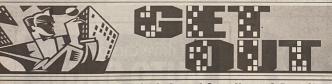
Jan Zelfer-Redmond's strong and Jan Zelfer-Redmond's strong and smoky abstract paintings project from their big, boxy frames like left-over Pompeiian ruins; occasionally the more heavily worked, agitated pieces resemble the amiable markings from a girls' locker room.
Zelfer-Redmond, 49, received her bachelor's in 1995. She lives in Sioux City, Iowa. Zelfer-Redmond may have come late to painting, but she was clearly ready for its challenges and obviously loves dealing with the

seductiveness of paint and color. In her current show at the Joseph Nease Gallery, Zelfer-Redmond's carivases have some of the scumbling of Cy Twombly's heavily worked abstractions, but Zelfer-Redmond's work is more subdued and the gestures less obvious than Twombly's. Her colors are organic; she uses a lot of mossy greens and russets the shade of fall foliage.

In "Untitled (gray, blue)" and "Limny" she paints the same kind of blue-gray shifts one sees looking down on the ocean while flying. One of her brightest pieces is "Unitled (salmon)," which resembles the pinks and reds of a freshly scraped wound and is startling in its immediacy.

At first sight, Zelfer-Redmond's paintings seem to be mostly beautiful washes of color with neumbral.

paintings seem to be mostly beautiful washes of color with penumbral, arcane markings, but in time sys-tems of numbers, double-helix spir-rals, letters and tic-tac-toe mark-ings reveal themselves. Some canvases are much more worked over than others. "A Plane Face" is an all-white field with indactine rable polychromed.

throughout the piece, and the artist's seven small works on paper contain clear graphite drawings that float over washes of neutral color. If there is any content or meaning with the markings, it is unclear.

As assured and compelling as
Zelfer-Redmond's paintings are, the
particular idiom she works in has
been well-plumbed and is becoming stale.

Like several artists in the last two

decades, she creates dreamy surfaces that reveal indecipherable

kinds of markings underneath all the painterly gesturing, encourag-ing the viewer to drift off into poetic

This kind of painting is not easy to pull off, and Zelfer-Redmond paints as if she invented this tech-

nique.

Fortunately she does not indulge in the kind of faux-naif qualities that are gratingly present in so much of this kind of work, and her surfaces are often exquisitely paint-

One just wants to see her stretcha little more stylistically. This is obvi-ously an artist who can go far. Also on view in the back room is "Four Hats," an installation by Shaun Cassidy. Hot pink, bright turnovise line green and blinding. Shaun Cassidy. Hot pink, bright turquoise, lime green and blindingly white groupings of stuffed animals that have been dipped in clay and fired are placed on concrete pillows that rest on swing sets hanging from stainless steel wire. Painted, empty wooden boxes rest beneath the swings.

These settings are like suburban archaeological finds, as if the detritus of childhood had been scavenged and deposited in a kind of

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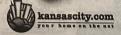
